Earlier I had the opportunity to go on a social-distanced walk with a friend, one who has been a support to me over the years and whom I have supported. I am thankful for friends and family to share life with. She spoke of her son going back to school and the many that are hard at work to make the space and teaching time for the children safe. I am thankful for the thoughtfulness of those who labour to get us through this safely: teachers, administrators, politicians, food bank servers, frontline workers, etc. Just today I have interacted with staff at a hospital and am grateful for the care we are offered under our healthcare system. I appreciate how they are being wise about keeping everyone safe by limiting visitors. And they are working hard to bring healing during the pandemic.

I am aware of an area where I have not been thankful enough.

There is so much to be thankful

for, even in these times of

challenge.

Maybe because I am not a gardener or farmer, I take for granted the fruit of the earth, the continual way that the soil sustains humankind. Lately my gaze has been turned to the need for taking care of the earth more deliberately due to the climate crisis. Just yesterday a large part of the ice sheet in Greenland split off. Scientists tell us that even greater melting is taking place than was imagined. This will lead to a more rapid increase in the rise of sea levels around the world. And there were five tropical cyclones in the Atlantic ocean at the same time for only the second time in history. Additionally, they have run out of names to call the tropical storms taking place, there are so many of them. Then we have the fires in California, which was under a heat-wave. They have caused smoke to be seen even in the GTA sky. Global warming/the climate crisis, however we name it, is linked to not caring for the earth properly. To God be the Glory, great things he has done.....



REPORT ON STEWARDSHIP

The following are my notes on the Webinar on Stewardship Giving that was presented by the Diocese in May 2020.

As an introduction, it was gratifying to see that we have already implemented a number of the proposals in the Webinar.

Outlined below are some of the ideas/suggestions that were presented.

Givings

Each parish church know the following about its congregation:

- No. of donors on pre-authorized giving ("PAR");
- Average PAR/envelope giving; and
- Age profile of donors.

Giving by PAR was encouraged as it is a much more successful way of maintaining income. Alternatively, for parishioners who are reluctant to sign up for pre-authorized giving, they could be asked to provide monthly post-dated cheques.

By knowing the ages of the donors and how much the donors of each age bracket are giving, the church has a better understanding of its potential problems. For example, if donors who are giving more than 50% are over the age of 90, the church will shortly have a financial problem.

It was suggested that the priest be aware of what parishioners are giving.

Staying in Touch

- a telethon to stay in touch with parishioners.

Fund Raisers

- Tea-less teas: a bag of tea is sent out with an invitation to enjoy the tea and to send in a donation
- Virtual Auction: can be carried out online
- Virtual pot-luck: would be similar to our coffee hour
- Virtual walk-a-thons: similar to a walk-a-thon but people would depart at different times.

Website

The importance of maintaining the website and keeping it up to date was emphasized. As an example, there is little value in having the details of the 2016 Strawberry Social on the website.

Streaming Services

The possibilities and importance of streaming services was also discussed.





We experienced a loss from which even today we have not really recovered. We took a beating that ripped into our heart and soul and tore us apart at the deepest place in our life. We went through the betrayal of a trust, the betrayal of a friendship, and still today we find ourselves dealing with its aftereffects and its residue. We suffered the unforgivable at the hands of a parent or the hands of someone we loved, and there's a scar there that breaks open over and over again.

Sometimes our tears come up and get very close to the surface. We can feel them just behind our eyes or even in our eyes. Sometimes they form a big lump in our throat. And then we realize again that they haven't gone away at all, that they're still there, that they've just been buried for awhile and now are back to make themselves known again.

O God, you are the one who looks way down deep inside of all of us. You see and know what no one knows, no one at all except we ourselves. And, not only do you see us and know us, but you also feel things along with us, even the very painful stuff, the deep stuff along with us, and we feel a strange kind of healing taking place. For it's like you care and you understand...and we're no longer left alone with our burdens.

Today, those of us who are struggling inside – who've been broken and hurt and still feel the tears within – we thank you for being there and sharing with us what we cannot bear alone.
