Leaving everything to follow jesus

The church remembers many holy and virtuous men and women who have lived and sometimes been killed for their love of God. In each issue of Connections we will offer a brief description of these people as their name days come up. Tradition and recorded history encourage us to follow their examples in our own Christian lives.

Four of the first apostles of Jesus' small band of loyal friends are remembered during the first half of May each year. They were present at the earliest stages of his ministry and continued his work after his resurrection.

Two were brothers, James and John, who was also called John the Evangelist or John the Divine, and is believed to have written the fourth Gospel, the three letters under his name



in the New Testament and the Book of Revelation. James witnessed the rising of Jairus' daughter, the Transfiguration and Jesus' agony at Gethsemane. The brothers were called the "sons of thunder" because of their fiery zeal in Jesus' service.

Philip, another early disciple, was present when John the Baptist first pointed to Jesus and declared him to be the Lamb of God. Philip was from Bethsaida, like

Andrew and Peter.

The fourth apostle remembered at this time is Matthias. He was with Jesus when he was baptized by John the Baptist and was one of the 72 sent out to preach and to heal the sick. After the Ascension, the eleven apostles who were left chose another to fill the place of Judas the traitor. Two faithful workers were named, so lots were drawn and Matthias became the twelfth apostle.

A MYSTIC AND A SOCIAL REFORMER

Two very different women, Julian of Norwich, a 14th century spiritual teacher, and Florence Nightingale, a who nursed wounded soldiers during the Crimean war, are honoured by the church in May.

Julian's book, Revelations of Divine Love, looks at some of the most profound mysteries of the Christian faith. She was never made a saint, but was and still is revered for the sincerity and beauty of her mind and the depth of her theological understanding.

Florence Nightingale was a woman born to wealth but determined to be useful. She is one of the most famous women in British history for her work as a head nurse in the Crimean war and her lifelong efforts to promote reformed nurses training and cleaner hospitals.

Known as "The Lady with the Lamp" for her habit in Crimea of going around the wards to comfort sick and dying men, she was respected by all in England and honoured by Queen Victoria, who presented her with this medal.



Ramadan Mubarak!

Beginning on May 5 and ending on June 4, our Muslim neighbours will observe Ramadan, the holiest month in their calendar. This is one of the Five Pillars of Islam, commemorating the first time the Koran was revealed to Muhammed, according to Islamic belief.

Ramadan is a time of spiritual reflection,

charity, devotion and worship, and is marked by fasting from food and water from dawn until sunset. The fast is obligatory for all healthy adults, with certain exceptions related to health and travelling. It is believed



that fasting teaches self-discipline and builds empathy for those less fortunate.

Muslims are also encouraged to read the whole Koran during this month, which ends with a great festival called Eid al-Fitr.

The greeting "Ramadan Mubarak!" means "Have a blessed Ramadan".
