DEACON'S CUJPBOARD

Pardon me if I sound like a broken record! Our numbers continue to increase: in March we saw an average of 171 families each week, seeking food for 508 people. This is our highest weekly average so far, and compares astoundingly to the March 2023 average of 76 families/229 people. Granted, there were five Thursdays in March last year and only four this year, but it still is a major indicator that, sadly, this ministry is here to stay. In the whole of 2023 we saw 5244 families and gave out food for 16,700 people. In the first three months of this year, we have already seen 2036 families, and given out food for 6,083 people.

The good news is, the community is stepping up to support us, and this is invaluable and essential to our effectiveness. On the Tuesday after Easter, Mr. and Mrs. Mackenzie from St. Mark's United Church brought us the donations from their "40 Days of Lent" food drive. As you can see from the photo, Detra and Eleanor have every reason to smile! So did I, hiding behind the camera!



As well, the Scarborough Theatre Guild has invited us to place donation boxes at the Theatre for their performances of the play "Trap for a Lonely Man" over the remaining three weekends of April. Patrons buying theatre tickets for any of their shows are invited to bring food items, and this time we (as near neighbours) have been designated as the beneficiaries. We have a poster, together with donation envelopes for those who prefer to give cash and flyers explaining who we are and what we do. After the first weekend of shows we had a car full of food, egg boxes and reusable bags, plus \$220 in cash donations. By the end of April we will have (hopefully) loaded up two more times with the donated non-perishable food and money donations.

Income for the first three months of 2024 is very encouraging. Offering, rental, and other income were all up, with total operating income up over 20% from last year. Deacon's Cupboard income was up 150% from last year January to March. While this is extremely positive, two factors affecting 2024 numbers should be noted. 1) Easter was in March this year versus in April last year. Some offering increase may be due to this timing, and 2) There was very generous support for the foodbank from persons outside the congregation which accounts for \$8,100 of the increase in foodbank donations. Over half of this was a onetime donation. Caveats aside, congratulations to the congregation, not only for your financial support, but also for your involvement in the foodbank and church programs such as the Sunday School which attract outside support and new parish members.

Operating expenses were up \$8,894. However, the total \$62,694 operating expenses for the quarter, were below the \$65,410 anticipated by the budget.

2024 will continue to challenge us, as expenses continue to rise with inflation. Assuming we can keep expenses to the budgeted amounts, we will need at least an \$15,000 increase in operating fund income from last year to balance for the year. We are off to an excellent start, and with your continued support and continuing to attract new members to the congregation, our prospects for another successful year are promising.

COST OF NOT RECYCLING PROPERLY

Warning bells are ringing for Christ Church’s waste removal program that deals with trash from our Kitchen & Parish Hall. Too much is being put into the wrong bags/containers and the City is checking carefully what’s in these bags. If something is incorrectly placed in the green or blue bin, they simply will **NOT** pick it up. Milk cartons, pop tins, plastic containers all must be rinsed, then put in the blue box bin: yet coffee cups must go in

the black garbage bin. Written policy for *any* group that rents our space is that they must take their garbage with them.

We are allowed only 2 large curbside containers for garbage pick-up (black bins). Any garbage that does not fit must have special City stickers @ \$6.32 per bag, in order to be picked up. The rate we are going it could cost us an extra **\$400 to \$600 per year**. Worse yet, if the City decides we are generating too much garbage, they could require us to hire a private contractor which could cost over **\$20,000 per year** for their containers/bins & weekly grounds clean-up, since animals easy get into these containers, spreading trash over our driveway, front & back lawns.
