#### A DIFFERENT WALK



### Refugee group seeks parish partner

Christ Church recently received the following information from AURA (Anglican United Refugee Association), an organization which has a history of assisting refugee sponsorships through partnership with local parishes.

The Wardens have discussed the possibility of our involvement in this project, and need to know whether parishioners would be willing to undertake such a commitment.

Here at AURA, we facilitate refugee sponsorship for the Anglican Diocese of Toronto. We have been approached by a Family Group in Scarborough who desperately wish to sponsor their relatives: a refugee family of seven from Kabul, Afghanistan. After being

threatened by a violent militia group and the murder of their oldest son, the family, which includes 5 children ages 5 - 21, fled to India in 2018. The Family Group in Scarborough is prepared to provide all the funds and settlement support required for the sponsorship.

AURA needs a parish to

partner with us and the Family Group to make this sponsorship possible. This would include the parish holding and disbursing the funds (provided in advance by the Family Group) and entering into the sponsorship agreement with AURA. We wish to identify a few people at your parish who would be willing to explore ways in which parishioners could be part of welcoming this refugee family.

#### We are not asking for any financial support.

Any direct involvement would be at the discretion of the parish and contingent on the availability of volunteers when the family arrives. Examples include: English conversation practice, helping children with schoolwork, sourcing donated furniture/items or showing the family around the city... we know that sponsorship works best when communities come together to welcome a family. If AURA finds a parish to help this family, we could submit the application this year. But it will likely be 1.5 - 2.5 years before they would arrive. Processing times are long and especially

uncertain because of the pandemic. After arrival, the one year sponsorship period begins.

Parishes all over the Diocese are collaborating in creative ways like this to enable more refugee resettlement. Your neighbours at Holy

Trinity Guildwood have been part of similar partnerships with much success. We have reached out to you because we know you are a community that cares about refugees, and this is an opportunity to support resettlement directly without an onerous commitment.

If you are you interested in exploring this with AURA and the Family Group, please let Pastor Pam know by March 31

# Voush Group Zooms about Cyberbullying

On Sunday afternoon, March 7, Christ Church youth and some youth leaders gathered by Zoom to talk about the group's choice of topic, cyberbullying. The meeting was organized by Emma Mallick, Joe Semucyo and Juliet Mazumder.

You may wonder why this topic was important to these young people. Let me provide you with a quote from a poll released by UNICEF and a UN Special Representative on Violence against Children (UNICEF September 3, 2019)

- One in three young people in 30 countries said they had been a victim of online bullying;
- One in five reported having skipped school due to cyberbullying and violence.

I want to point out the bravery of our youth in choosing to deal with such a sensitive subject and doing so in a careful and informative way. They chose as a theme verse Deuteronomy 31: 8. "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the Lord your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you."

They also told us about Kids Help Phone, which offers confidential, anonymous phone and internet counselling and referrals for children and youth, with information on bullying, dating, family, friendship and health at 1-800-668-6868 or www.kidshelpphone.ca.

With the issue of bullying in mind (and their schooling, which can be onerous), I ask for your prayers for the young people of our church and beyond.

I would be remiss if I didn't mention that some laughs were had by all during the online games of Hangman and Pictionary (let me tell you that it is not so easy to draw food with a small computer device!)
